Reported speech in English – The rules

Rule sheet



The rules

Reported speech is used to say what somebody else said. This way you can emphasise that what you report is not your own opinion but a statement somebody else made. Normally you start with an introductory sentence like *He said that ...* or *She mentioned that ...*. You can vary with the reporting verbs you use instead of always using the verb *to say*. The verbs in these sentences are always in the *simple past*. In reported speech tenses are back shifted.

Direct speech	→	Indirect/Reported speech
Peter says: "I eat a lot of meat."		Peter said that he ate a lot of meat.
simple present	→	simple past
Peter says: "I am eating a sandwich."		Peter said that he was eating a sandwich.
present progressive	→	past progressive
Peter said: "I ate a lot of meat."		Peter said that he had eaten a lot of meat.
simple past	→	past perfect
Peter said: "I have eaten a lot of meat."		Peter said that he had eaten a lot of meat.
present perfect	→	past perfect
Peter says: "I will eat less meat."		Peter said that he would eat less meat.
will-future	→	conditional
Peter says: "Can you eat less meat, please?"		Peter asked me if I could eat less meat.
can	→	could

Don't forget to change the pronouns as well!

If you want to ask a question you use the *if* or *whether* if there is no question word in the sentence in direct speech.

With commands in reported speech you use the *infinitive + (not) to*.

Expressions of time and place need to be shifted too in reported speech:

	→	
today/tonight		that day/that night
this week/year/...		that week/year/...
yesterday		the day before
tomorrow		the next/following day
